**\* More opportunities for short-term U.S. volunteers**

Since its inception in 1996, Mwangaza has utilized the gifts of U.S. volunteers in the fields of education, computers, and AIDS. We seek volunteers in many fields. See contact information below.



**\* Environment**

Malaria and water-borne diseases are the number one killer in Africa. The Mwangaza curricula will include life-saving information that addresses environmental knowledge.



**\* Technology**

The digital divide is dramatically and quickly widening the gap between those who have access to knowledge and those who do not. Mwangaza is initiating an On-Line Partnership which pairs U.S. and Tanzanian secondary teachers by subject matter. Via the Internet, they will develop lesson plans collaboratively, with their products being featured at Mwangaza's annual June seminars.



**\* Extending the horizons of Binti-Mama/Mwana-Baba**

The Mwangaza staff is exploring a proposal to blend the Mother-Daughter and Father-Son programs into a single program with opportunities for dialogue of important issues through drama, problem-posing pictures, role-playing, music, and discussion.

# Mwangaza's Ten-Year Programmatic Impact



## HIV/AIDS

- \* Behavior change key to program
- \* 200 students in 25 schools trained as leaders
- \* 100 teachers trained

**IMPACT: 14,000 men, women, students**

## Binti-Mama/Daughter-Mother

- \* Life skill literacy for girls and women
- \* 110 women trained as leaders from 20 dioceses
- \* Three courses developed

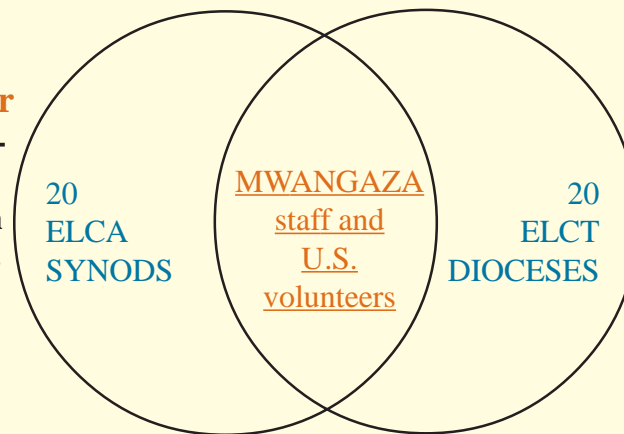
**IMPACT: 35,000 women**



## Mwana-Baba/Son-Father

- \* Program thrust: ethical family management
- \* 84 pastors/evangelists from 14 dioceses trained as leaders

**IMPACT: 20,000 men**



## Text Books

- \* Critical to learning, yet absent
- \* \$16,000 purchased 1,600 government textbooks

**IMPACT: Reducing the 10:1 student-to-book ratio**



## Computers and Computer Training

- \* Utilizing 21st Century Technology
- \* 125 computers installed in 41 schools
- \* Teachers in 15 schools trained

**IMPACT: 60 teachers**

## Teachers' Professional Development

- \* Updating teachers' skills and knowledge
- \* 54 secondary schools received seminars
- \* 1000 teachers trained
- \* Extra June seminars held annually

**IMPACT: 30,000 students**
